LETTER FROM OUR CEO, RABBI AVI DABUSH

2024 was a year of profound challenges.

As advocates for peace, we navigated one of the bloodiest chapters in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict—its effects felt across the region. The situation remains fragile.

In Israel, the war fueled radicalization.



Extremist elements in government used their power to erode democracy promote endless conflict—fulfilling the biblical curse: "By your sword shall live."

Even in these dark times, Rabbis for Human Rights remained a beacon of hope.

In 2024, we mobilized hundreds of Israeli and international volunteers to support vulnerable Palestinian communities and protect West Bank farmers during harvest.

We stood with Jews and Arabs living in poverty, advocated in the Knesset, and empowered grassroots activists from marginalized communities.

Our interfaith work grew stronger, uniting Jewish, Muslim, and Christian leaders in dialogue and prayer. Over 1,000 pre-army students joined educational programs rooted in Jewish and universal human rights, including visits to East Jerusalem and unrecognized Bedouin villages.

We also welcomed 170+ Israeli rabbis into our movement—proof we are not a fringe voice but a growing moral force in Israeli society.

We ended the year with a powerful crowdfunding campaign—raising nearly half a million shekels from 600+ donors. This generosity reflects a shared belief in faith-based activism.

Together, we're building a more just and compassionate future.

FIGHTING FOR A CEASEFIRE & THE RETURN OF HOSTAGES

"There is no greater mitzvah than redeeming captives" (Mishneh Torah, 8:10, Maimonides)

Throughout 2024, our Rabbis and activists have consistently advocated for a ceasefire to end the war and ensure the safe return of the hostages. This unwavering message has been at the heart of every action and event we've led.

RHR has organized tours for Rabbis, educators, and decision-makers to the Gaza envelope and border, where they have heard firsthand from survivors of October 7th and met with families of those still held hostage in Gaza.

Our CEO, Rabbi Avi Dabush, along with other members from the region, continue to serve as a moral compass—bearing witness to the human tragedy while calling for an urgent end to the bloodshed.

HUMAN RIGHTS IN THE OCCUPIED TERRITORIES

PLANTING JUSTICE

In 2024 we brought Israelis and Palestinians together to plant 650 trees in Palestinian villages in the West Bank and in unrecognised Bedouin communities in the Negev.

PROTECTIVE PRESENCE

Across the Jordan Valley, Masafer Yatta and in agricultural communities south of Nablus, RHR provided shepherding escorts, offering protection against settler violence.

For the first time, we also brought a delegation of Jewish students in collaboration with Achvat Amim, integrating protective presence into their program and deepening their engagement with communities under threat.

OLIVE HARVEST

In the shadow of the war, Palestinians were prevented from harvesting their olives. An estimated 96,000 (OCHA) dunams remained unharvested due to Jewish settler terror and military restrictions.

Through this hard time, we assisted Palestinians in accessing their land and brought 1000 activists to take part in harvesting with 34 different communities.

In 2024, RHR deepened its commitment to fostering interfaith dialogue and cooperation. This year, we established the Interfaith Forum for Human Rights, where, alongside partner organizations, we co-created a platform to discuss our shared values regarding conflict resolution.

The 2nd Annual March united faith leaders, hundreds of volunteers, and representatives dozens organizations. from of partner Preceding the ultra-nationalist Jerusalem Day Flag Parade, the March presents a shared vision for equality and peace in the Holy City. RHR's Mechinot educational programs remain central to our mission, instilling Jewish values and human rights principles in the next generation of Israeli leaders. This year, we expanded and refined our curriculum, continuing a legacy of transformative education...

In May, RHR's third Social Justice Week, held with 15 partner organizations, featured 44 events and a website with study materials. This collaboration broadened engagement with Judaism's social justice values through lessons, conferences, and community gatherings.

HADERA RIGHTS CENTER


RHR's Rights Center serves the residents of Hadera and the Wadi Aara region.

TACKLING POVERTY

FIGHTING POVERTY

We secured a council seat within the Authority for the Fight Against Poverty for a representative from low-income communities, ensuring their voices in decision-making. We also advanced the creation of a State Authority to Tackle Poverty, laying the groundwork for long-term structural support for struggling families.

HOUSING AND WELFARE

We advanced **key housing and welfare reforms,** ensuring respectful communication standards and lease extensions for elderly public housing tenants. **Through targeted advocacy**, we prevented welfare benefit freezes, safeguarding support for vulnerable populations. **Additionally, we expanded food voucher eligibility,** increasing access to essential assistance for under-served communities.





